**STOCK ASSOCIATION.**  
 A meeting of the Dis-  
 tinctive Stock Association,  
 No. 9, Lincoln county,  
 was held at Upper  
 Pecos school house, Monday, Jan.  
 1886, with A. W. Bryan, presi-  
 dent, in the chair.  
 Minutes of the last meeting read  
 and approved.  
 On motion of Frank Garst, the or-  
 der of business was changed, and  
 applications for membership were in-  
 troduced.  
 The following gentlemen, all duly  
 vouched for, were presented for  
 membership: Capt. J. T. Bennett,  
 Sam Collins, Dr. J. F. Rogers, Wm.  
 Ratliff, James A. Baird, J. E. Prath-  
 er, J. F. Hinkle, W. R. Shoemaker,  
 D. L. Stephens, W. R. Merritt, S. F.  
 Brown.  
 On motion of Jno. P. Eaker, the  
 officers were suspended and the gen-  
 eral assembly elected by acclamation.  
 W. P. Boyd, from the committee  
 appointed to inspect the amount of  
 water controlled, and the number of  
 acres owned, by Rhodius, McNeil  
 Baker, reported that, after a  
 high investigation, they could  
 not out one mile of water controlled  
 by the above parties, and that they  
 had between 1,000 and 1,100 head  
 of cattle on the range. Report ac-  
 cepted and the committee discharged.  
 Messrs. Garst and Gunter, of the  
 committee to confer with counsel,  
 reported: "That they had been  
 advised by some of the most promi-  
 nent attorneys of the territory that  
 they could be legally collected  
 from their ranges. Further,  
 every intruder was a vio-  
 lator of the quarantine law. In re-  
 crossing the quarantine line  
 inspection papers, the law  
 is explicit, and all that was  
 to have the law enforced  
 violation of the same was  
 to file complaint, and  
 to collect on it."  
 As many members were  
 aware of the offence  
 punishable by \$5,000 fine and  
 imprisonment.  
 On motion of T. C. Tillotson,  
 the officers were instructed to  
 make as soon as practica-  
 ble a known quarantine  
 line.  
 The officers were elected  
 for the year: President,  
 T. C. Tillotson; Vice President,  
 Alf. Hunter; Secretary, T. C. Tillot-  
 son.  
 The meeting finished, the  
 members all bid  
 adieu.





**A STRANGE CASE OF ABDUC-
