

RUSSIA AND CLOUDCROFT.

Migratory Lumber Town and Noted Pleasure and Health Resort.

A correspondent of the Santa Fe New Mexican says: Otero county has, a town almost six years old that has changed its site five times during the time of its existence. Its name has also changed that many times and at present it is known as Russia. It is called a lumber camp, but it is more of a town than many that have been on the territorial map for years.

The population of Russia is several hundred and its houses are perched on both sides of Russia canon for a distance of a mile. For natural scen ery it cannot be surpassed and is one of the most picturesque little places in the county. Far into the Sacramento mountains, a large force of men are working stripping the virgin forests of their best timber and these men live at Russia. Here there are about a hundred little wooden houses, several of them used as bunk houses for the upmarried men of the community; a commissary conducted by the New Mexico Tie and Timber Company, which has the contract for cutting all the timber: a railroad shop and roundhouse for the four Shea engines used in hauling logs to the main line at the Russia station; a postoffice and schohouse. There are two cook houses and mess rooms, one for the loggers

and the other for the railroad men. From the station to the town it is about two miles and descent of several bundred feet, which necessitates a switch track near the station. In Russia and Wayne canons there are eight miles of track and a crew of laborers time by following our example and is now engaged in laying new steel, as the logging operations continue up the canon. At present the men are

working three miles from town.

Previous camps have been at Balley's. Fresnal canon and James canon. In the course of a year the little town will be transferred again to some other canon.

Many visitors from Cloudcroft drive over to see the logging operations, which are interesting indeed to those who have never seen anything of the kind.

The Alamagordo & Sacramento rallroad consists of twenty-six miles of track between Alamogordo and Cloudcroft, the most beautiful summer resort in this part of the United States. to reach which the road ascends almost a mile. The terminal of the line is at Russia, six miles from Clouderoft, where the timber is brought up from Russia canon, for shipment to the mills of the Alamogordo Lumber Com-

Death of Solicitor General.

A Santa Fe dispatch of October 20th says: Edward Leland Bartlett, solicitor general of New Mexico, died last night of nervous prostration, complicated with typhoid symptoms, after an illness of two weeks. He was born in Oxford county, Maine, in 1847, and moved to Kansas with his father in

In the early sixties he matriculated at Bowdoin College, from which his father and three uncles had graduated. He returned to Kansas in 1866, where he studied law with his father until 1869, when he entered the law department of the University of Michigan. He was admitted to the bar of the Supreme Court of that state in the same year. He practiced at Wyandotte, now Kansas City, Kansas, until 1880, when he removed to Santa Fe for the benefit of his wife's health.

The deceased was adjutant general of the territory under Governors Sheldon and Ross, assisted the regulars in the Apache campaigns of 1883, 1884 and 1885 and was active in suppressing cattle thieves and outlaws in the southern part of the territory. In 1889 he was appointed solicitor general of the territory and, with the exception of three years, had held that position ever since. He was a member of the United States Land Commission, of the Territorial Board of Public Lands, of the Capitol custodian committee, and was one of the originators of the New Mexico Bar Association and its sec-

retary since its beginning in 1886. He was chairman of the Republican territorial central committee for two consecutive terms and for many years chairman of the county central committee. He served as a member of the City Council and of the City Board of Education and was twice president of the Santa Fe Board of Trade. He was a thirty-second degree Mason; was the first grand commander of the grand commandery of Knights Templar of New Mexico, grand chancellor of the grand lodge of Knights of Pythins of Kansas and an enthusiastic Odd

Fellow. He was a delegate to every territorial Republican convention during the last twelve years, and was chairman of the commission which compiled the New Mexico statutes in 1886, also a member of the commission which compiled them in 1897. His wife died a little over a year ago and his children died in infancy. He is survived by one brother, who lives in Chicago.

Bad Roads in New Moxico.

NEW MEXICO NEWS SUMMARY

The record breaking motor cycle cross country run, from Denver to Albuquerque, made no records. Sergeant Capron and Private C. W. Boien, of Uncle Sam's army, found New Mexico roads something too much for even their hardened constitutions to say nothing of the motor cycles, and at last accounts they were hiking back toward Denver from Watrous, riding on plush seats, of a Santa Fe chair car, the motor cycles in the baggage car shead. There was comparatively little difficulty until the men got across Raton pass and then the trouble commenced. An Albuquerque man who met the returning cyclists at Trinidad was told that in many places they had to make a detour of five miles to get around a washed out wagon bridge, and that at other times they had to carry the heavy machines for miles, or drag them along. The machines, they say, stood the strain well, but no machine, they say, could have stood the work through the washed out district south of Watrous. After looking over the situation from that point they wired to General Baldwin's adjutant to fix them out with transportation back to headquarters. It has been advanced that the time chosen for this run was not particularly propitious. but even if this be true, the use of motor cycles will be considerably discouraged in the army in the Colorado department.—Albuquerque Journal.

Veteran Starves to Death.

An Albuquerque dispatch of October 23d says: Joseph Clarke, aged 83 years, a veteran of the Civil War and for seventeen years a citizen of Albuquerque, starved to death while lost in the great uplands which lie between Albuquerque and the Sandia mountains, seventeen miles to the east. 

METHODS OF PROLONGING LIFE

British Scientist Says the Average of Life Has Been Extended Ten Years-But Others Question His Statement

The best way to live to produce health and happiness and to prolong life continues to be a never-ending problem. Has any progress been made toward its solution? Dr. Oliver Ferguson, a well known British scientist in a recent lecture at Oxford, said:

He maintained that the average length of life has been extended about ten years within the last sixty, but the proof was apparently not furnished. On the contrary, a royal commission. investigating that subject in connecous deterioration in the British race. In this case proof was furnished in the increased difficulty of obtaining army | Bright's disease. recruits and in the character of the recruits when obtained.

Premier Balfour found an explanation in the emigration from Great Britain and in the removal of the best of the "country people" to the towns and cities. Whatever the explanation, there is no question that there has been an impairment of the race in England. This does not appear to agree with Dr. Ferguson's statement as to an extension of the average length of life about a decade. That extension of life would be the result of better care of the health and would not accord with the Progress is being made all the time

in the discovery of the cause and cure of disease. Many-smallpox, for instance, which ravaged England in former time-are now comparatively unknown. This progress should have an effect in lengthening human life. That will be accomplished whenever proper attention is given to dieting and to sleeping. A well regulated system of eating and drinking, with plenty of sleep and exercise, will, as a rule, prolong the life of almost any person. But many take what they can get, though more choice might perhaps be

The advocates of less food seem to present a good case. It is claimed that as a result of recent experiments in decreasing the amount of food efficiency was increased from 100 to 200 per cent. A champion wrestler increased his units of efficiency from 4,500 to 8,000. The smaller consumption of food is said to have been attended with greater keenness and energy and less disposition to become fatigued. Doubtless eating less and masticating the food better would result in a great improvement. But the majority of the human race seems indisposed to make the test.—Philadelphia Press.

Bow-Legged Soidiers.

Hereafter the War Department will not accept bow-legged recruits for the cavalry-so it is reported. How does the department expect them to maintain their seats in the saddle? Will the department adopt the recommendation made by Lieutenant Derby (John Phonix) a half century since, that every cavalry saddle have a hook, and there be inserted into the seat of the trousers of each trooper a ring to catch the book and hold the bold warrior secure in the saddle?—The Oasis.

Sawdust Pavements.

Sawdust is lending itself to more and more uses constantly. Shipbuilders in England, France and Germany are now using what is called "stone wood" a mixture of sawdust with certain minerals, which, formed into slabs under hydraulic pressure, makes a surface which is safe to walk upon and will not burn or permit one to slip. This substance can be worked like any hard wood, and is being extensively used.—Boston Globe.


