OF INTEREST TO TEACHERS.

Territorial Superintendent, Hiram Hadley, has issued the following circular letter to county superintendents in reference to granting excuses for non attendance during teacher's institutes...

Santa Fe New Mexico. Oct. 18, 1905.

To County Superintendents: Under the fear that in some cases there is too great leniency in granting excuses for non attendance of the institute to those who desire to teach...

The law provides for the institutes for the purpose of improving the schools. It expects all who teach to attend in good faith, gain some things themselves, and contribute what they can to the success of the institute...

A proper excuse for non-attendance is difficult to itemize; personal sickness or that of some member of the family is a good excuse. Being otherwise employed, or having other work to do, is no excuse...

This law is a good one. If the county superintendents wish their schools to improve, they must get better teachers. If a teacher will not cheerfully attend the institute, it is quite certain he is not interested in his work...

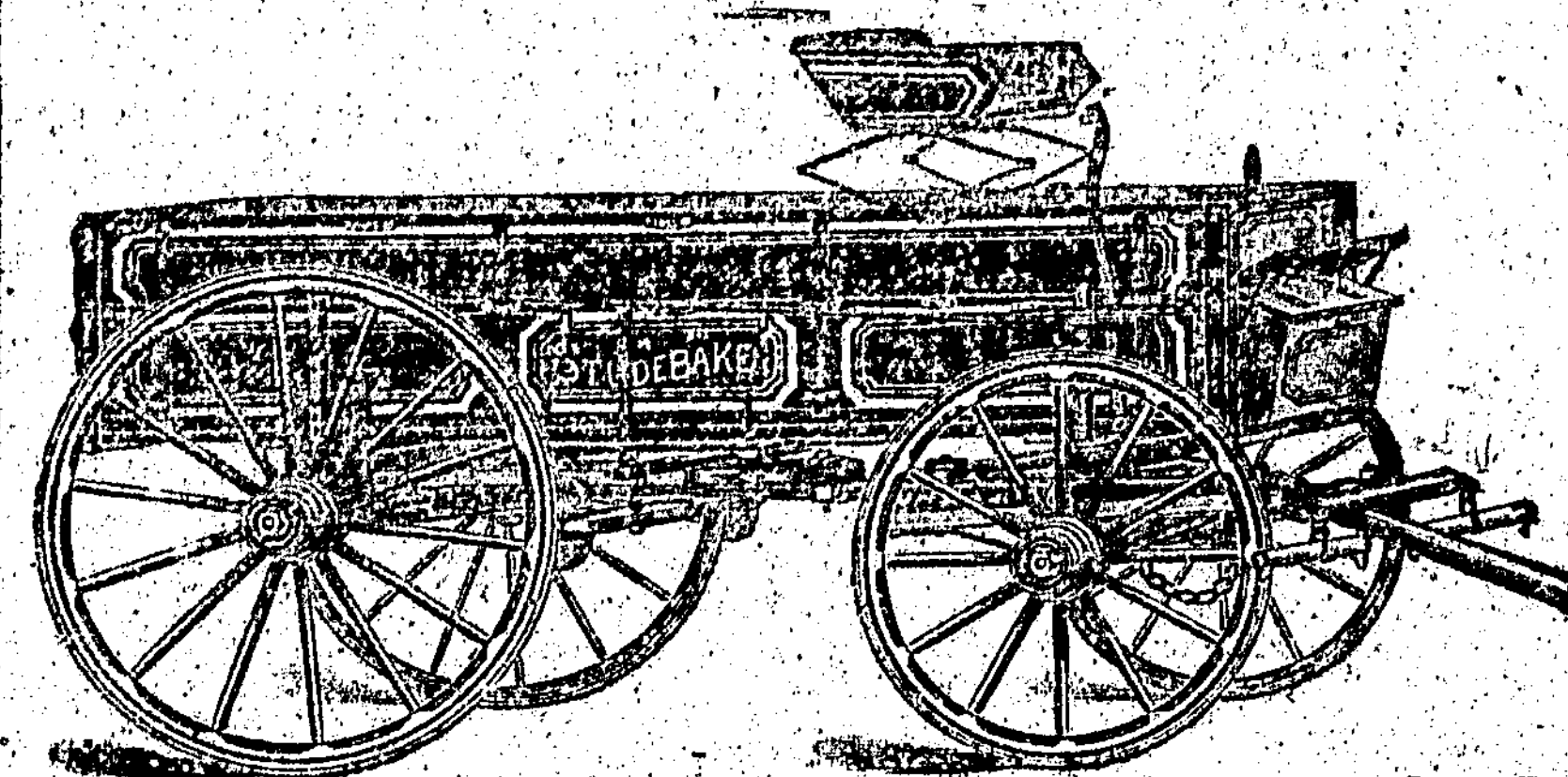
Many men have their lofty ideals until they are met by the demands of self interest.
