

for collections, saying that I
would have to wait awhile,
but the last time I saw him
he discouraged me.

This bill was contracted by
McSweeney and Tumstall, they
agreed to pay me \$3 & each mail
or \$1.50 per week (it was a tri-
weekly mail) for running a private
mail sack for themselves and a
dozen of their friends; I run it
over a year without a settlement
although I have McSweeney's written
promise, dated shortly before
he was killed, promising to settle
soon as he got home to Louisville.
This bill I have divided between
the McSweeney and the Tumstall
estates. The bill, altogether is
\$118.28. The balance of it as far
postage stamps, stamped envelopes,
etc., for which I paid cash. I
acknowledged my claims, and
