THE APEX TAX CASE IN A NUTSHELL.

Inasmuch as Wharton, Weiner and Lund have opened this matter we want to, in as few lines as possible, place this rotten transaction before the voters of Lincoln county.

Lund, as attorney for the stockholders of the Apex mining company, was well aware to get a clear title to the property, the taxes must be paid. He was in correspondence with Brockway and others in Boston and knew what was being done.

When he made his "deal" with Weiner to find a purchaser for the property he knew the money was in the hands of these people to pay these back taxes.

Nearly every business man in White Oaks knew that these taxes were to be paid and if Weiner did not know it he has less brains than he is credited with, and that is not much.

Weiner being the White Oaks member, the other two commissioners naturally left it to his "Judgment" (?) to make the deal.

There was no more necessity to pay Lund a commission to collect these taxes than to pay him for collecting taxes from the Car rizozo cattle company.

Since Ira Sanger refuses to allow his name to go on the Big Four ticket, for commissioner from the 2nd district, dozens of good democrats have been asked to accept the place but so far the empty honor is going begging. Capt. Krouse will be elected. He is in every respect a good man for the place, why not make his election unanimous.

Weiner boasts that he will get the support of the Capitan coal company. W. P. Thompson would be ungrateful if he did not support the "whole cheese" of the present board, for Sol gave Thompson permission to fence up the town of Capitan. This is one of the many kind of political "fences" Sol has been putting up for the past two years at the expense of the people.

Such stereotyped phrases of "wash" as "constitutional" "billingsgate old hypocrite," "to be the common language" by Sid Wharton of the White Oaks Eagle. A man who cannot find better language than "You tickle my back, W. P. and Sol, old boy, will tickle yours." See!

Parson R. E. Land runs into print and says Weiner requested him (Land) to defend him in the Apex Mining company tax case. It's a sorry defense the Parson makes, in fact he leads Solomon Caesar further out into mire.

Now, as the Parson has voluntarily (if) come on to the witness stand will he please answer a few questions regarding this Apex tax case?

Mr Land, did you not take advantage of your position as attorney for the stockholders of the Apex mining company, knowing as you did that the money was up to pay these taxes?

As attorney for the Apex mining company, knowing that this money was either in White Oak or would be there soon, why did you and Mr Weiner single the Apex company out from other companies who were likewise in arrears for taxes?

Is it not a fact that you, as attorney for the Apex mining company know that this seven thousand dollars of tax money due from them, was up when you, and Mr Weiner, as chairman of the county board, made the contract to pay you five per cent commission for its collection?

How you as attorney for the stockholders of the Apex mining company act honestly as attorney for Lincoln county in any suit against said company for the collection of said taxes?

Did not Mr Weiner know at the time he agreed to pay you five per cent of the amount of such taxes that you were the local attorney for the Apex mining company?

As at that time there were other companies owing the county equally as large sums for back taxes as the Apex company, why did not you and Mr Weiner attempt to recover from them?

Do you, as a professional lawyer say that Mr Weiner had a legal right to pay you a commission out of the county funds for the collection of this or any other tax money when the county delegates this power to certain officials of which neither you or Mr Weiner are one?

Did not you and Mr Weiner both know that the Apex company were about to transfer the property and that the county must be paid in case of such a transfer?

Now Parson, as you are "defending" Mr Weiner in this case don't get so angry as to call us "criminal liar," billingsgate old hypocrite," and say such naughty words as "malicious falsehood," "gross error," "dishonorable," etc. as in your last week's article.

Remember that old saying: "When the gods would destroy they first cause mad."

We say that Mr Weiner, was the "old hypocrite" going you five per cent commission out of the county funds for the collection of taxes that you both know must have both known must be voluntarily paid, that he had no legal right to employ you as such attorney paying therefore out of the county funds, that Mr Weiner did wrong in making such a contract without advising first with the county's attorney and the other members of the board.

Mr Homan will secure a big majority in Lincoln county.

The Capitan coal company refused to support Whitesides because he refused to appoint Ed Smith as deputy sheriff in the event of his (Whitesides) election. Just watch these fellows on election day and see how they will work; the book-keeper for the coal company is chairman of the democratic county central committee.
